Tragedy

Katie Klein offers these observations: "As a granddaughter of Carrol Sutton, I know I am exceedingly blessed to have had such a godly example of how to live as a Christian. Since his death, I have spoken to many Christians, some of whom I had never met, who knew Granddaddy and whose lives he impacted for the better. Some have said that they never met him, but read his monthly bulletin, or listened to recordings of his sermons. Others knew

him well and told me a story or two about Granddaddy I had not previously heard. Even after his passing, his godly influence remains, and my respect and love for Granddaddy continues to grow. Granddaddy was a humble man. He was never harsh or cruel, even with those with whom he disagreed, but he was firm and never held back in preaching the truth. It is hard to talk about Granddaddy without Grandmother because of how closely they worked together in the home and in the kingdom. Their love for each other and for the Lord is a beautiful example of the husband and wife relationship as God intended it to be. I have so much hope for Granddaddy because of the devoted life he lived as a child of God. Because of his life and his faith. I am more certain of his eternal home, and I can rejoice in that knowledge with the peace of God, which passes all understanding."

What about us? We know not what the future holds, nor what the day may bring forth. Life is a vapor. Are we prepared to meet our Maker? If you died tonight, where would you spend eternity?

physical ailments allow that for you. Thank you for how much you have done for the Lord, the local church, the GOT Foundation, but most especially for your family. You have inspired me to do more."

Brother Connie Adams said, "Daphnie is truly a jewel who has patiently stood by Thomas and lovingly cared for him. Their two sons have also been a strong support. I will always be grateful for his work, not only to make *Truth Magazine* accessible but he also did the same for *Searching the Scriptures*. When his hands failed to be useful at his computer, he managed to do his work by voice control. Bobby and I have stayed in their home twice during meetings at Westside. What a blessing that was."

Ron Halbrook said, "I met Thomas Keese many years ago when holding meetings in the Wichita, KS area and immediately recognized his dedication to Christ and to the gospel. In 2007 I began *Help A Neighbor* as a means to help brethren who donate significant funds to the Philippine work so that they can have a legal tax deduction. H.A.N. is approved by the I.R.S. as a nonprofit charity. Thomas soon learned about it and out of the goodness of his heart volunteered to use his skills to create a website to provide information and reports about H.A.N. He has maintained the site *http:// helpaneighbor.net/* gratis through the years but relinguished this task to his son, Jacob, a couple of years ago as his condition worsened. This is just one example of the guiet but valuable work he has done for the cause of Christ. I can be a better Christian because of the example and influence of this good brother."

Mike O'Neal, who preaches for the Westside church in Wichita, KS where the Keese family worships, has been a close observer of the family as they evidenced faithfulness through trials.

He said, "Words are inadequate to express the depth and breadth of the love, respect, admiration and appreciation the brethren at the Westside church of Christ in Wichita, KS have for Thomas Keese and his faithful family. The reason for such regard is not because of all that he has suffered due to the MS that ravaged his physical body, but the result of his spiritual life, godly influence and humble devotion to the cause of Christ, Thomas, instead of allowing disease to hinder his service, found various ways to be actively engaged, including setting up and managing websites for several congregations and brotherhood publications. Articles written by Thomas have been a source of insightful, biblical teaching and great encouragement to many brethren and can be read on his personal website: http://4suchatimeasthis.org/. He also developed a very useful search engine http://seekye1st.net/for sermons, Bible class material and other publications. All (including myself) who have had the

privilege to know Thomas have been benefited and blessed spiritually by the experience. Paraphrasing the tribute given Dorcas in Acts 9:36 is certainly appropriate when referring to Thomas' life: 'full of good works and charitable deeds which he has done.'"

What about us? Life has no guarantees. Time and chance overtake all. If our lives are limited by some unexpected handicap or infirmity, how would we react? Would we wallow in despair, or make the best of a bad situation?

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The Preservation of God's Word

How can we know the Bible is complete? Is something missing? Was something left out? Does Scripture offer any answers?

My grandchildren have some puzzles we keep in a box of toys in the room where they stay whenever they visit. They are simple puzzles with only about 20 pieces but occasionally one or two of the pieces gets misplaced. When that happens, even if all the other pieces are in place, it's not a complete picture-something is missing. We learned in our first lesson that the writers who wrote the Bible claim to have done so by the direct guidance of God. If we accept their claim, a question that immediately arises is how can we know that the Holy Spirit did not also inspire other authors to write other books not found in the Bible? Does the Bible have all of God's revealed word or is something missing?

Three Facts About God and His Word

If we accept that God has revealed Himself through the written word we must notice some things God has revealed about Himself and His word.

1. God is All-Powerful.

Unlike gods of mythology and false religion, the God revealed in the Bible is omnipotent, a word that means "all-powerful." Solomon declared, "our God is greater than all gods" (2 Chron. 7:5). Jeremiah wrote, "'Ah, Lord God! Behold, You have made the heavens and the earth by Your great power and outstretched arm. There is nothing too hard for You" (Jer. 33:17). God is "the Maker of all things" (Jer. 10:16; 51:19), and Jesus, God in the flesh, said, "with God all things are possible" (Matt. 19:26). So that means while humans may try to resist God's will, they cannot overpower Him.

2. God's Word Accomplishes Its Purpose.

When God spoke to Isaiah, He compared His word to rain and snow that water the earth and cause growth. He declared, "So shall My word be that goes forth from My mouth; it shall not return to Me void, but it shall accomplish what I please, and it shall prosper in the thing for which I sent it" (Isa. 55:11). So if God sends forth His word and God is all-powerful, man cannot prevent God's word from accomplishing its intended purpose. As a result...

3. God's Word Endures Forever.

All throughout the Bible, it is taught that God's word cannot pass away. David proclaimed, "The entirety of Your word is truth, and every one of Your righteous judgments endures forever" (Ps. 119:160). Isaiah was told to, "Cry out!" the truth that "All flesh is grass, and all its loveliness is like the flower of the field. The grass withers, the flower fades... but the word of our God stands forever" (Isa. 40:6-8). Jesus, God in the flesh, declared, "Heaven and earth will pass away, but My words will by no means pass away" (Matt. 24:34; Mark 13:30; Luke 21:32). Finally, Peter described the word of the gospel

of Christ as an "incorruptible" seed that is "the word of God which lives and abides forever" going on to quote Isaiah 40:6-8 (1 Pet. 1:22-25).

So if God is all-powerful, and His word endures forever, what does that tell us about whether the Bible is missing something? If man could successfully remove, destroy, erase, or delete something from the divine revelation God intended to preserve, wouldn't that mean human beings had overcome God? Yes. So along with the claim that the Bible is from God, we must also understand that it teaches the principle that God will preserve His word.

Free Will and Providence

How can that be true if we all have the freedom to choose right or wrong? I could make the decision right now to take a Bible and cut out all the pages that teach things I don't like. I could burn every bookstore that sells Bibles and force everyone I could to give up their Bibles to be burned. Wouldn't that succeed in destroying God's word? No. We'll see in future lessons that there actually have been times when people tried to do these very things, but even though human beings have free will (the right to choose right or wrong), an all-powerful God always exercises providence.

The word "providence" comes from a Latin word that means "to foresee." It refers to the ways God provides things to His people. The Bible makes it clear that God knows everything that will happen long before it occurs. James declared, "Known to God from eternity are all His works" (Acts 15:18). Isaiah taught that God is One, "Declaring the end from the beginning, and from ancient times things that are not yet done..." (Isa. 46:10). Imagine that you knew someone was about to hit you in the face—would you move your head to prevent him from hitting you? Would you take steps to try and make him change his mind about taking that swing? If you let him hit you would you put some ice nearby to soothe the pain? God is so far above us! God knows everything we will ever do, and can act in ways to make certain that even if people try to destroy His word, it will be preserved for those who need it or for the time when people will follow it.

Examples of God's Preservation of His Word

Let's notice two examples of this recorded in the Bible. Near the final days of the southern kingdom of Judah, the Israelites had become so wicked they had given themselves to the most extreme forms of idolatry ever practiced in ancient times including child sacrifice and temple prostitution (cf. 2 Kings 23:7-10). Any remnants of true worship according to the Law of Moses came only from traditions held in the memory of the people. This happened because God's word fell into such disuse that the book of the Law had actually been lost! On one occasion when the temple was being cleared, Scripture records, "Now when they brought out the money that was brought into the house of the Lord, Hilkiah the priest found the Book of the Law of the Lord, given by Moses. Then Hilkiah answered and said to Shaphan the scribe, 'I have found the Book of the Law in the house of the Lord.' And Hilkiah gave the book to Shaphan" (2 Chron. 34:14). When the law was read to king Josiah, he committed himself

to lead the nation in restoration of true worship of God according to His word.

Unfortunately Josiah's son, Jehoiakim, did not have the same respect for God's word. When the Lord led Jeremiah to send a message from Him to the king, the Bible records, "And it happened, when Jehudi had read three or four columns, that the king cut it with the scribe's knife and cast it into the fire that was on the hearth. until all the scroll was consumed in the fire that was on the hearth" (Jer. 36:23). Because he didn't like what God said, Jehoiakim tried to destroy it! Did he succeed? No. God commanded Jeremiah, "Take yet another scroll, and write on it all the former words that were in the first scroll which Jehojakim the king of Judah has burned" (Jer. 36:28).

Even though people disregarded God's word so much that it was lost, God preserved it for the time when good hearts would obey its commands. Even though people tried to silence and destroy God's word, God preserved it for those who would respect it. Today we can trust that God has preserved His word just as He intended. Nothing is lost. Nothing is missing. It exists just as God intended. In future lessons we will see historical examples of this in God's providential preservation of His word through the ages.

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The Principle of the Learner (1)

Teaching a Bible class can be one of the most rewarding things we do, unless we have poor listeners. At that point, everyone's time is wasted. God's word provides principles that help us all become better listeners.

We move now to the second principle of the mind, the Law of the Learner, which states, "The Learner must attend with interest to the material being learned." Our challenge is to make this truth a reality. "One may as well talk to the dead as to attempt to teach a child who is wholly inattentive" (John Milton Gregory, *The Seven Laws of Teaching*, 34). Our class periods are too short to plead with the children to cooperate.

The purpose of these next few articles is to emphasize the responsibility of the learner, but because they are young, adults are still responsible for the type of listeners they become. We continue the search for catalysts to motivate the mind and the will of our children to do what we need them to do because they want to do it.

Let us, like the Master, carefully observe a little child, that we may learn from him what education is; for education, in its broadest meaning, embraces all the steps and processes by which an infant is gradually transformed into a full-grown and intelligent man (Gregory, 7).

We can all understand this quote; we observe it every day. Imagine it in an illustration where we have two cliffs. We place the little child on one side and envision him as the transformed "full-grown and intelligent man" on the other side. The path from one side to the other is made up of all the "steps and processes" it takes to get him there.

Our primary focus in the spiritual education of our children is that they one day walk with the Lord. The Scriptures are filled with this purpose for our lives, but I want to look at how the apostle Paul states it: "For this reason we also, since the day we heard it, do not cease to pray for you, and to ask that you may be filled with the knowledge of His will in all wisdom and spiritual understanding that you may walk worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing Him, being fruitful in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God" (Col. 1:9-10).

In effect, Paul emphasizes the "steps and processes" that will help us walk worthy of the Lord, etc. He was concerned with the spiritual education and growth of the church then, and of course it applies to us today. For the sake of our illustration, I would like to suggest that these three aspects (knowledge, understanding, and wisdom) become the structural pieces needed to develop and improve our daily walk with God. Little children must take this path, and we must continue in it.

Just as God's word gives us principles to become the best teachers we can be, He continues to guide us in this next principle of the mind. We are looking for catalysts; we are looking for beginnings: "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge..." (Prov. 1:7). "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom, and knowledge of the Holy One is understanding" (Prov. 9:10).

Fear is the divine motivation in the processes of gathering the needed information (knowledge), internalizing it (understanding) and applying it (wisdom). Spiritual education embraces these and transforms us into people of God.

In our next article, we will make specific application of these verses to our children.

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Grace and Faith

We are saved by grace through faith. While often misunderstood and controversial, grace and faith are inseparable conditions for our salvation.

For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: not of works, lest any man should boast (Eph. 2:8-9).

There may be no clearer doctrinal explanation for human salvation than the above cite passage. Yet, despite Paul's clarity on the subject, there may be no greater doctrinal controversy than the nature of human salvation. What is the extent of God's role in salvation? What is the extent of our role in salvation? Does God do everything and we do nothing? If we do something, does that negate what God does? Whose role in salvation is greater? God's or ours? These are important questions to which the Bible gives answers.

Just as there are two parties in salvation, God and man, there are two elements in salvation: grace and faith. First, consider God's grace. Simply defined, grace is a gift. God's gift is offered in spite of the recipients being entirely undeserving. There are many examples of God giving an undeserving humanity gifts. God gives humanity air to breath and food to eat. He makes the sun to rise on the evil and good and sends rain on the unjust and just (Matt. 5:45). God has given humanity the gift of His word. We can understand God and His expectation for us as the result of the word of His grace (1 Cor. 2; Acts 20:32). Most significantly, God has given undeserving humanity the gift of His Son: "For God so loved the world,

that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16). The Son of God makes our salvation possible (Titus 2:10). None of these gifts can be earned. We are not owed anything from God.

Now, most do not question God's grace. Few would deny these examples of God's grace. The controversies surrounding the nature of human salvation do not concern what God has done. Rather, controversies surround how man is to respond to God's grace. What is our role in human salvation?

Many people object to placing conditions on human salvation. The theology of human salvation accepted by most of western society can be described in the following statement. "Jesus died; therefore we are saved." This is not a new concept. When the Gospel began to be preached, the Jews falsely charged Christianity as teaching a person could live in sin and be saved due to the grace of God. The Jews had the law to restrain sin. Christians had grace which only encouraged sin. Paul addressed this false charge: "What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound? God forbid. How shall we, that are dead to sin, live any longer therein?" (Rom. 6:1-2). Evidently, there was more to salvation than simply receiving the grace of God.

Now consider our faith. Grace is God's part in salvation. Faith is our part

in salvation. Simply defined, faith is belief which affects action. Faith is a response to God's grace. For example, do we believe God gave humanity the gift of His Son? If we believe, how must we respond? How is this belief to impact our lives? Is there something we are to do in response to God's grace?

If we are to be saved, we must obey. We must act on our faith. James contended man was to demonstrate his faith by his works (James 2:14-26). Faith without works is dead. If we do not obey, we will be lost. God's grace demands action. For example, Paul wrote Titus, "For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men, teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in this present world; looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Savior Jesus Christ; who gave himself for us, that he might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works" (Titus 2:11-14).

God's grace is instructive to a humanity dead in sin. Specifically, God's grace teaches that we are to deny ungodliness and worldly lusts. It teaches us we are to live soberly, righteously, godly, and with hope. If we deny ungodliness and worldly lusts, do we void God's grace? If we live soberly, righteously, godly, and with hope, are we saved by self-righteousness? Will God owe us salvation? Absolutely not. God's grace simply demands a response. If we are going to receive the gift of God's grace, salvation, we must obey.

Obedience cuts to the nature of faith. God does not just want us to acknowledge His existence, or that He sent His Son for our salvation. James said even the devils believe and tremble (James 2:19). Of course, however, the forces of evil do not obey the God whose existence they acknowledge. Likewise, faith without works is dead (James 2:20).

God wants us to obey Him as a result of what we believe. The Hebrews writer illustrated example after example of people who acted on their faith (Heb. 11). By faith, Noah built an ark, Abraham left his homeland, Sara conceived, Moses endured suffering, the walls of Jericho fell, and Rahab helped God's people. None of these individuals would have received the blessings of faith, salvation, had they not acted on their faith. Their faith would have been dead.

Well, what does the nature of faith mean to us in receiving the grace of God? We must obey what God, His Son, and the inspired apostles have commanded. For example, the resurrected Christ said, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned" (Mark 16:16). Jesus commanded faith and a condition in order to be saved. We must believe and be baptized to be saved. If we do not believe, we will not be saved. Now, most people are willing to accept we must believe to be saved. We must believe Jesus is the resurrected Son of God (John 8:23-24). This is true. However, many do not believe we must be baptized to be saved. Why? Why are people willing to accept part of Jesus' commands of salvation, but not all of

His commands? What is the problem? What is the issue regarding baptism?

The problem people have with Jesus' command is not in regards to the act of baptism. They may protest baptism and argue against many points related to baptism. However, the issue is not with baptism; rather it is a faith issue. Ultimately, people who reject what Jesus and the apostles have said regarding baptism do not believe. They lack faith. They lack the accompanying works of faith. Therefore, their faith is dead (James 2:24).

Dead faith has deadly consequences. Dead faith will keep us dead in our trespasses and sins. Paul described how the Ephesians had been in such a perilous condition. However, they were revived as they received God's grace through faith (Eph. 2:1-9). After Paul performed a miracle, Luke wrote, "And this was known to all the Jews and Greeks also dwelling at Ephesus; and fear fell on them all, and the name of the Lord Jesus was magnified. And many that believed came, and confessed, and shewed their deeds. Many of them also which used curious arts brought their books together, and burned them before all men: and they counted the price of them. and found it fifty thousand pieces of silver" (Acts 19:17-19). Did the deeds of the Ephesians nullify God's grace? Of course not. They served as evidence of their conversion.

In conclusion, we are saved by grace through faith. By God's grace, we can have faith. Without God's grace, faith would be impossible. Without God's grace, salvation would be impossible. We would be hopelessly lost. Even with our faith, salvation will always be God's gift. We will never be deserving of salvation. If we have done all we can do to faithfully serve God, we still will be undeserving of Heaven. Our righteousness will always be like filthy rags (Isa. 64:6). Only the Lamb of God is truly worthy (Rev. 5:1-5). When we have done all we have been told to do, we will still be unprofitable servants (Luke 17:10). No matter how loyal and faithful, salvation will always be God's gift to undeserving servants.

What is especially sad about the controversies surrounding human salvation, is that most are in agreement regarding man's utter lack of righteousness. The controversies surround what God's grace demands of us. God's grace demands that we obey His commands. It demands that we abstain from sin (Titus 2:11-14). It demands that we direct our abilities towards the pursuit and practice of righteousness (Rom. 6:16-19). In the end, only those who have kept God's commandments and the faith of Jesus Christ will be saved (Rev. 14:12).

We must never pit doctrinal concepts against each other. We need to understand doctrinal concepts like grace and faith. We need to study and analyze them independently. However, we must also find how they fit together. Grace and faith are not opposing doctrinal concepts. They are companions of human salvation. This is how Paul presented them. They are inseparable. We cannot have salvation by one and not the other. We are not saved by grace alone. We are not saved by faith alone. Salvation calls for both grace and faith. We must learn all of what the Bible has revealed on any given doctrinal topic and then begin to draw conclusions. When two subjects are presented together, we must find out how they fit together. Hopefully, this study has aided in this vital process. T



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Commitment to Marriage

Belief in the Lord's teaching on the permanence of marriage and commitment to live in obedience to His word saved our marriage.

From Sandy's lesson in the 2006 book, *God Give Us Christian Homes*, one would know that she and I had some rough times during the early years of our marriage. There were times when both of us were so exhausted, exasperated, and desperate that the temptation of the Devil made divorce appealing. Not all marriages start off with smooth sailing and continue without conflicts. At least, that is our experience.

Commitment to Marriage

What kept us together through these difficult years? Both of us had made a commitment to be obedient to the Lord Jesus and both of us understood Jesus' teaching on divorce and remarriage.

But I say to you that whoever divorces his wife for any reason except sexual immorality causes her to commit adultery; and whoever marries a woman who is divorced commits adultery (Matt. 5:31 32).

And I say to you, whoever divorces his wife, except for sexual immorality, and marries another, commits adultery; and whoever marries her who is divorced commits adultery (Matt. 19:9).

Or do you not know, brethren (for I speak to those who know the law), that the law has dominion over a man as long as he lives? For the woman who has a husband is bound by the law to her husband as long as he lives. But if the husband dies, she is released from the law of her husband (Rom. 7:1 2).

Both of us understood that Jesus allowed remarriage following a divorce only if one's mate were guilty of sexual immorality. One who divorces for another reason and marries another is guilty of adultery. Marriage is a commitment to one another so long as we both shall live. Our common commitment to live in accordance with the law of the Lord kept us together during those years of conflict and struggle.

The Bible teaches that one's relationship toward one's spouse is not determined by the emotional ups and downs of human circumstance. Marriage is a covenant that we make to one another. Isaac and Rebekah agreed to marriage without the American custom of courting in order to build sexual feelings and emotional bonds toward one another (Gen. 24:67). The covenants that one makes in life do not always lead to a warm emotional feeling. I made a covenant with my banker to pay him monthly payments on my car until I got it paid for and a covenant with my mortgage company to pay them so much every month for fifteen years to purchase my house. There were times when I did not really have a warm feeling about my obligations. However, I was obligated

to them and to God to honor those commitments.

Marriage is also a covenant between a man and a woman (Prov. 2:17; Mal. 2:14). Many show more faithfulness to their covenants to the bank and mortgage company than they do to their marriage covenant

God expects a person to keep his vows and that applies to marriage vows as well as any other vow. "When you make a vow to God, do not delay to pay it; for He has no pleasure in fools. Pay what you have vowed" (Eccl. 5:4).

Commitment to the Teaching of Christ

What enabled us to overcome our conflicts and difficulties? The Law of the Lord enabled us to work through these conflicts. Each of us had a commitment to Jesus to treat each other in accordance with the teachings of Christ. Several of the very basic principles of Christianity helped us. Therefore, whatever you want men to do to you, do also to them, for this is the Law and the Prophets (Matt. 7:12).

This "Golden Rule" of conduct toward others should begin in our relationship to each other. Though each of us was imperfect in obedience to this biblical instruction, it was one guiding star in our marriage.

The appeal to one's commitment to Christ is the means to resolve conflicts that occur between two people in marriage. What does God teach that you should do in this situation? If a person will not act in the way that one wants his/her spouse wants to act because she/he loves him/her, an appeal can be made to persuade them to act in obedience to the Lord's word. This is why it is so important to marry someone who has a relationship with God. There will be times when what the other wishes is trumped by what vou want and vice versa. In such times of conflict, the appeal to what Christ wants from each of us guides one through the conflict.

James Dobson wrote in one of his books about one's obligation to love his/her mate. As I recall what he wrote, someone came to him explaining his/ her intention to divorce his/her spouse because he/she did not love her/ him anymore. Dobson reminded the person about God's commandment to love one's mate: "Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ also loved the church and gave Himself for her" (Eph. 5:25) and "admonish the young women to love their husbands" (Tit. 2:4). The person protested, "I can't do that because I don't love her/him." Dobson continued by saying, if you cannot love your companion as you are commanded to do as a partner in marriage, love him/her as a brother/ sister in Christ: "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; as I have loved you, that you also love one another" (John 13:34). If you cannot love the spouse because he/ she is a child of God, love him as a

neighbor, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Matt. 22:39). And, if you cannot love your spouse as a neighbor, love him/her as an enemy, "But I say to you, love your enemies, bless those who curse you, do good to those who hate you, and pray for those who spitefully use you and persecute you" (Matt. 5:44). There is no escaping one's obligation to love his/her mate! This is my remembrance of what Dobson wrote and I hope that I have correctly recalled that he was the one who wrote this.

Conclusion

Beginning with these commitments and honoring the word of God enabled my wife and me to work through our problems and build a home that has already lasted more than fifty years, to rear two precious children who also married Christians and are rearing their own children to love and honor God.

Do not walk away from your commitments in the heat of conflict. Submit yourself to God's will and to each other in the fear of the Lord (Eph. 5:21). Ask God to lead you through the difficult times and commit yourself to honoring Him in your marriage. You will be surprised with the blessings that He gives to His children.

QUESTION: Is it unscriptural to sing these songs because of the words: "Heaven Came Down" and "Kneel at the Cross"? A member states that heaven did not come down and we do not kneel at the cross. I do not take it literally. It is spiritual. Please help.

Many songs were written by denominational song writers who had a poor understanding of New Testament teaching. I believe the two songs which you named are among them. For this reason the songs might seem to express ideas in ways that do not conform to New Testament teaching. Compounding this problem is the use of figures of speech, which in themselves are not wrong because the Holy Spirit employed them widely in the Scriptures. We do ourselves and others a disfavor if we fail to acquaint ourselves with figurative language, so we can understand both the Bible and the many songs which use such language.

If there is adequate teaching as a background for such songs, God's people should then be able to sing them with scriptural meaning, though there are some songs so blatant in their conflict with Biblical instruction they should be omitted. Without adequate teaching, such songs should be omitted.

When the song "Heaven Came Down" speaks of heaven coming down, it really refers to the One who resides in heaven, in a figure of speech known as metonymy. This figure sometimes puts the person for the place where he lives (or vice versa), the container for its contents (or vice versa), the cause for its effect (or vice versa), etc. God (Heaven) does "come down" figuratively (condescend to man) in His forgiveness of one obedient to the Gospel of Christ (Mark 16:15-16; Acts 2:38). While the writer probably meant the coming down in a miraculous sense of heavenly glory sending a feeling or emotional overwhelming as evidence of pardon for one who merely believes (the usual denominational explanation of conversion), we can sing the song with proper teaching and understanding. It is always good for teaching to occur on such songs so we

can sing them with understanding (1 Cor. 14:15).

In the song "Kneel at the Cross," the song's writer likely meant that we kneel at the cross by praying the Sinner's Prayer to God for Him to save us. We must understand, however, that we do "kneel" (bow, submit) at the cross by believing in the Christ who died on the cross and responding to His will for us to repent and be baptized (Acts 2:38). Likewise Christians who have strayed into sin or error must also bow or "kneel" for forgiveness and restoration by repenting, confessing their sins, and praying God for His forgiveness (Acts 8:22-24). All forgiveness of sins depends upon the intercessory work of Jesus Christ – His sacrifice for sins and the continuing power of the blood of Christ to atone for our sins (John 1:29; 1 Cor. 5:7; Heb. 7:25; 1 John 2:1-2). In this way "Christ will meet you there."

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Sodom Has Been Found

The location of ancient Sodom has long been assumed to have been south of (or beneath) the Dead Sea. Recent archaeological research, performed by Dr. Steven Collins, points in a different direction.

Who in modern times has not read the account of the destruction of ancient Sodom in Genesis 18 and not been left to think: "I wonder whatever became of that once great city?" Over the last two generations it seems that perpetual frustration has beset the biblical archaeology community on account of the identification of the city with Bab edh-Dhra (and Gomorrah with Numeirah in the same area) and the fact that this site seemed an impossible match for the location of the city of sin to the south of the Dead Sea. Neither of those sites date from the right era, and their destruction was 25 years apart rather than contiguous with one another as the Bible affirms.

This false identification in the south even had Russian archaeologists searching the seabed beneath the Salt Sea for the remains of the complex of cities, all to no avail. (Although, it has rightly been observed by some modern scholars that at the present time, the Sea is lower than it has ever been in its entire history, so a location beneath the waves of this body of salty water is not very probable.)

G. Ernest Wright and William Foxwell Albright, along with others who shared their way of thinking about biblical sites during the time of Abraham, originally placed its location at the south end of the Sea. Their view was taken as undeniable by most modern researchers until recently. Dr. Steven Collins changed all that, even though there are still some holdouts who question his identification of the site. That number is growing smaller, however.

According to his own account of events. Collins went to the approximate area where Abraham and Lot stood prior to the nephew's departure for the vicinity of Sodom, i.e. in the foothills between Bethel and Ai. From that point he looked across to the East to the kikkar of the Jordan, the flat round disk of earth at the end of the Jordan River valley as the river enters the plain and empties into the Dead Sea. The Bible says that Abraham watched as the cities of the plain were terminated. He saw clearly the column of smoke as it rose to the heavens. If Abraham could see it from there, then he ought to be able to see it from there also, Dr. Collins reasoned.

Collins observed that he could not see the south end of the Dead Sea from that perspective, but that the north end of the Jordan rift valley was easily visible from that angle. Additionally, several other features of the biblical description were met by that area. The text says that the region was "well watered like the garden of the Lord, like the land of Egypt" (Gen. 13:10), which is characteristic of the sector north of the Dead Sea, but not south of it. As well, it is alluded to as the "*kikkar* of the Jordan," which associates it naturally with the north of the Sea but not south of that body of water (Gen. 13:10). Moreover, when Lot travelled in the direction of Sodom, the Bible says that he went "toward the East" (Gen. 13:11), which again fits the northern area nicely but does not work with the area beneath the Sea, which is mostly in a southerly direction.

So Professor Collins decided to travel to the area and scout the locations present which might represent potential candidates for the once mighty city of the plain. In his book Discovering the city of Sodom (2013), Collins describes his logic in approaching the search for the city. By a process called "sherding" wherein the sherds of ancient pottery were examined from each of the potential sites, he knew that he was looking for a Middle Bronze Age site (more specifically, MB2, a fact generally recognized on account of the nature of the cultural indicators regarding the Abrahamic Age in the Bible), so those that did not contain sherds of pottery from that age would be immediately bracketed out. Those that did would be placed on a list of possible candidates.

Also, Sodom is always listed first in order of seeming importance when it is described with a list of other cities in the Bible, so he reasoned that it must have been a major city of very large dimensions as well as relative importance as compared with others in the area. After much time spent examining every potential site north of the sea in the *kikkar* region, he settled upon a single location, described as Tall el-Hammam ("hill of the hot baths").

The most interesting feature of this location was that it fit the biblical description perfectly, with a settlement period up to MB2 and a long period of desolation for seven centuries afterward, with an interesting configuration of other ancient cities nearby. A second smaller site which could potentially be identified as Gomorrah stood not far away, and two other sites, a major one (most likely Admah), and a double city that matched Zeboiim (the name is a Hebrew plural), both stood off to the northeast. As might be expected, a great number of small ancient villages also dotted the area round about.

When Dr. Collins visited the mound where the city once stood, he was impressed by the sheer magnitude of the massive ancient city that had once been there and wondered that no archaeologist up to now had ever considered that it might be the location of ancient Sodom. "The wonder is that it has escaped the notice of most Bible-focused archaeologists, all but virginally untouched for most of the one-hundred-plus years that modern archaeology has existed," he wrote (23). Collins noted that "ten of the City of David would have fit inside Sodom's city walls, with room to spare." It's towering height gave it a visual vantage point, and subsequent excavation has shown that, over its history, there is no indication that it was ever destroyed by a military enemy. "Somewhere between 150 and 200 million mud bricks formed a rampart around it that made its great height virtually

unscalable. With a 35-degree incline, and covered over with a smooth layer of dried clay, no human being or beast could climb up it without great, hunched-over, vulnerable struggle" (36).

The city is associated with an extensive field of megalithic stone circles, menhirs (large upright standing stones), and more than 500 bench-like stone dolmens (covering several square kilometers and aggregately larger than the landscape of Stonehenge). Tall el-Hammam has also been identified as Abel Mizraim (Gen. 50:11) of Joseph's era, and Abel Shittim, the final camping sites of Moses and the Israelites before they crossed into Canaan (Num. 33:49). It was obvious to Collins from the start that this site represented one of the largest Bronze Age cities in the southern Levant during that historic era. It has both an upper and a lower city. The upper one is one hundred feet higher and less than half the size of the lower one. The Tall proper spreads over almost 90 acres, all apparently within the ancient city's fortifications.

Surveys and subsequent excavations have confirmed that there existed in this location a general occupational footprint at this spot from as far back as the Chalcolithic Period through the Middle Bronze Age, some 1500 years total. Significant later occupation on many parts of the site are evident during the late Iron Age as well as the Roman period. Collins and his excavators have been working the site for over a decade now, with very exciting results.

A Tribute to My Dad

This year marks my Dad, Mike Willis, 40th year of work with *Truth Magazine*. I was in kindergarten the year Dad began his work at the magazine. Because many years Dad worked from a home office or very close by, I was fortunate to closely observe him in his day-to-day work.

The first real office I remember Dad having was his home office in Dayton, Ohio. Dad was more of a morning person than Mom, so he was the one who often was up before anyone in the house. He made sure my brother and I were up and ready for school. When we headed down for breakfast, you could always find Dad in the same place—his chair. He always had two things in that chair—a book, often the Bible, and a red pen.

As the years passed, regardless of where we lived, I could always find Dad in the early morning or in the evenings reading with a red pen. Today, I know those were a few of the many times he was working. Because of two important jobs he held as preacher and employee of Guardian of Truth Foundation, Dad balanced his time carefully—making sure his day included appropriate time to work, time with his family as well as time for personal study. Over the years, I have learned several lessons watching my Dad:

The Value of a Strong Work Ethic

In the Willis family, there is a joke that hard work is just part of the "Willis" genes. O.J. and Wilhelmina Willis taught their seven children the important lesson of hard work. Hard work was just a way of life. This wasn't a family born with any money or silver spoons. Rather, O.J. and Wilhelmina provided for their home by working long hours, running a small store, tending to a garden as well as managing the normal chores of the home. Each child was expected to do his or her part. Through this work, the lessons of childhood ultimately translated into a strong work ethic in adulthood. In fact, using each of their own strengths, each one of the Willis children achieved success. I truly believe this success was due in part to learning the importance of work during their formative years.

With the flexibility of working from home, Dad could have maintained a slow or easy pace. He could have neglected work, taken advantage of the flexibility or recorded time he didn't work. In all his years with the magazine, I am not aware of Dad ever missing a deadline. Instead, week after week, month after month, year after year, his work ethic was clearly demonstrated. Magazines went out on time, commentaries and class literature were written, and when he worked with a local congregation, he prepared sermons. Bible classes and met the needs of the local body.

While Dad had a strong internal drive instilled from childhood, I believe this work ethic was also firmly tied to Biblical teaching. As Paul directed the church of Colossae, "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward" (Col. 3:23-24). Solomon also spoke about work when he said, "Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might" (Eccl. 9:10).

Dad seemed to always do his best in his work. If he had worked in the public sector, his work would have been easily recognized. His employer may have moved him up the ladder resulting in raises, promotions, bonuses and accolades. Dad worked just as hard as anyone who worked in the public sector. For Dad, he didn't work hard for these rewards. He simply was a hard worker who believed doing his best was his foremost job as a Christian in the workplace.

Leading by Example

The very first job I ever remember having was with the magazine. At the ripe age of 7-8 years old, I was paid to stuff flyers into magazines for a penny a piece. I remember stuffing magazines while watching the *Electric Company*, *3-2-1 Contact*, and *Happy Days*. My focus was simple—I was looking for the almighty dollar.

Obviously, working for a non-profit and a church isn't something you pursue to get rich. You work in these arenas because of a different drive. I always remember Dad having passion for his work. In fact, if you were to ask him today, he would tell you that he never worked a day in his life. What drove his passion? He was passionate about learning God's word. As we know in Acts 17:11, the Bereans were of noble character because of the way they eagerly examined the Scriptures daily. Dad had that same eagerness for the Word. If he didn't have a Bible in his hand, he had a commentary or another reference book to deepen his understanding of the Bible. While I was in school learning my ABCs, Dad was teaching himself Greek and Hebrew. He hungered to learn God's word.

As a preacher of the gospel and the editor of *Truth Magazine*, I believe Dad understood the magnitude of his work. He knew the importance of teaching the truth, all the truth and only the truth. He focused on "rightly dividing the truth" (2 Tim. 2:15). He knew he would be judged more strictly because of teaching the truth (James 3:1). In no way did he want to make others stumble.

Through his diligence and yearning for the Word, I learned the importance of Bible study. He taught me the importance of not just taking the words I hear from the pulpit as "gospel." Rather, if I hear something I don't understand or that doesn't sound right, I study. While this takes time and effort, the importance of study is clearly demonstrated in 1 Peter 3:15 which states we should "always be prepared to give answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have."

Navigating the Challenges with Work

Every job has its challenges. With the magazine, the challenges weren't as simple as making a deadline. Often the challenges Dad faced came as a consequence of writing the unpopular. Dad didn't shy away from identifying dangerous trends emerging in the church or calling out brethren introducing false doctrines. When these were brought to light in the magazine, Dad often became the target. As a bystander, though I didn't always understand what was going on, I certainly understood the pressure that Dad faced.

Dad could have easily gone a different route. He could have opted to publish only positive and encouraging articles. He could have gone the route of "tickling the ears." He certainly would have been more liked and perhaps popular. Dad chose differently. He chose the route of standing for truth and for exposing error at any cost.

In the workplace, each and every one of us faces fork-in-the-road moments. In these moments we have to make decisions. Will we follow Christ and take a stand, or follow our own will? In most workplaces, forks in the road may be something similar to these:

- Will we choose to walk away or say something instead of laughing at an offensive joke?
- Will we stay silent or choose to love the sinner while speaking up when asked about our beliefs regarding homosexuality, adultery or living together before marriage?
- Will we choose to bend the truth or choose honesty even if honesty costs us an important sale or relationship?
- Will we remain silent or choose to share the gospel when a moment arises?

Though the challenges we face are different, I believe the Bible is clear about how to manage these challenges. Paul taught us he was "not ashamed of the gospel of Christ" (Rom. 1:16). He spoke boldly and refused to compromise a stand for truth, even in the face of persecution. When I face work challenges, I pray for boldness and courage to do what's right, to show Christ in my actions and to stand for truth. I pray I am unashamed to share the gospel, come what may. As a Human Resources leader, I have been privileged to celebrate when employees reach work anniversary milestones. It's certainly rare in today's workplace to see anyone who has given 40 years to one company. I am blessed to be part of this celebration to recognize Dad's 40 years of work with *Truth Magazine*. While I've shared only a few lessons I've learned, I'm thankful for the many more I've observed and for his labors through the years.

It's a joy to pick up a commentary Dad has written or study from one of his class books. These moments give me an opportunity to see my Dad through a different set of eyes as I gain more understanding of a Biblical concept. Now that I have my own children, it's also a pleasure to watch my children's eyes light up when they see something their "Papaw" wrote.

Over the last 40 years, Dad has not only impacted my life, his work has impacted the lives of many Christians. Most importantly, He leaves us with an vital legacy—an unwavering stand for the truth even in the face of difficult consequences.

Dad, thank you for your years of service, your powerful example in the workplace and most importantly, teaching truth through your actions!

Forty Years and a Mountain of Work

When Mike Willis, as a young man, took on the editorship of *Truth Magazine*, it was at a critical time. His studious habits and strong work ethic helped to right the ship. In the years following, there have been a number of critical issues to confront. An editor's chair is often an uneasy place to sit. There are always Monday morning quarterbacks who know exactly how each issue should be handled.

Yet, while many other periodicals have gone out of business, *Truth Magazine* has survived. It was my good pleasure to serve as Associate Editor for several years. During that time, Mike and I discussed many things. We did not always agree but there was never a time when we became disagreeable with each other.

Mike's work involved far more than editing the magazine. His editorial work includes the publishing of many study books for Bible classes, various books and the monumental task of editing and publishing the *Truth Commentary* series which includes commentaries on every book in the New Testament and several in the Old Testament. These are major study tools which will be around for many years to help teachers and preachers and other Christians in their study of the Bible. He has also guided the process of making these available in digital form. When I look at the shelves in my library and see the

number of books and study tools which Mike has edited, I stand amazed.

In Appreciation of Mike Willis

As a young preacher I came to appreciate the work of Mike Willis long before I ever met him. Unlike some preachers, I did not have the privilege of working in a training-program or studying the Bible with sound teachers in school. When I began to preach, it was with smaller churches with no elders. That can be a rather lonely kind of experience. Advice from those older in the faith is valued as you struggle to answer tough questions, try to figure out how to resolve difficulties within a congregation, and determine sound positions on various issues.

Before the internet, it wasn't always easy to find good sources for sound material. A subscription to Guardian of Truth and Christianity Magazine became vital spiritual nourishment. I would comb through every issue to consider what I could learn about this topic, that biblical text, or how to apply God's word to our lives. It didn't take long to realize that there wasn't very much out there that Mike Willis hadn't written about! Whether it was the challenging problems one encounters in First Corinthians, or practical challenges faced by an evangelist seeking to preach the gospel—Mike was never afraid to tackle even the most controversial of questions.

Probably the first time I saw Mike was when he and brother Ed Harrell engaged in an open forum discussion at the *Florida College Lectures* over issues concerning fellowship and false doctrine on marriage, divorce, and remarriage. I know some grew

discouraged over battles fought on such subjects, but I saw it much differently. A few years before I started preaching I had come out of an institutional background. In my experience, there had been few with whom I worshipped that would ever be willing to standup for and test any doctrines. To me it was a breath of fresh air to see men love the Lord and the truth enough to defend it as they understood it. Somehow during those years Mike found an article I wrote entitled "Spanking and the Inspiration of Scripture" and published it long before we had ever even carried on a conversation.

Years later I got a call one day and it was Mike Willis. He had seen my website and we talked about various issues and I began to send him articles from time to time. This ultimately led to a request from him to write a Romans workbook and a commentary on Matthew. Along the way he also edited a few other books I submitted to him and commissioned me to draw dozens of maps and other artwork for Truth Publications.

Unfortunately, I have never had the opportunity to spend much time with Mike face to face for any extended period. We have always lived anywhere from 6-15 hours away from each other. Even so, you don't work with someone on over 20,000 pages of material without getting to know him pretty well. Mike and I have not always agreed on everything, but in all things I have found him to be conscientious and respectful. He is a man seeking to demonstrate love for God and obedience to His word. Even when he and I have a different understanding of a particular issue, he has always been willing to consider my position and explain his own based on his understanding of Scripture—not his preferences or personal desires. Because of this, I value him as my brother in Christ and friend. I am grateful to God for the work he has done in the Lord's kingdom and the blessing he has been in my life. I know he has been a blessing to many (like me in the past) who may never have met him in the flesh but grown because of the good work he has done. Thank you, Mike for the years you have devoted to Truth Magazine and the mountain of articles, books, and lessons you have produced in service to our God.

All of us, if God grants us the opportunity while still on this earth, will someday be able to look back upon the life we have lived and take some accounting of what we have accomplished. Some of us will not be very happy with what we have done with our time here. We may simply think of it as "much time wasted," or else, "most of it wasted."

At any rate, our own personal glimpse back over our years and whatever we may have done with them will most likely be assessed in terms of what could be summed up under the heading, "Productivity." Mike was the editor of all of those issues and headed up the publishing business at the same time, along with being a member of the board of directors and helping with the functioning of the attendant bookstores (CEI Bookstore and Truth Bookstore).

In our view, the literary endeavors that have been produced under his aegis represent an impressive array of works on a whole range of subjects. It would, in fact, be very difficult to tally the full number of books, tracts, pamphlets, and other materials that have passed through his hands and have been edited and corrected by him over those many years. Of course, many have gone out of print over time. But the current portfolio of titles is, in and of itself, impressive indeed. Just take a look at the present catalog of Truth Publications. Most every one of those titles was personally edited by Mike. The Bible Text Book and Truth Commentaries alone are major accomplishments. Mike has written many titles himself over the years. What he has not written, he has profoundly influenced by his editorial work.

On a personal note, Mike has edited all five of the commentaries that I have in print, along with the other books printed and sold through this publishing organization. From my perspective as a writer, I am qualified to say that he has been both an encouragement at times and an aggravator at others. Getting authors to produce what they have promised is not always easy, especially when they are preachers and already have busy schedules! That is where the aggravation comes into play.

It has always been a pleasure to work with him, and I hope that he will enjoy both good health and long life to be able to do more good work in the future as he changes from editorin-chief to his new role as an associate editor with the group.

Mike Willis: Soldier of Christ and Friend

I have known Mike Willis since 1965 when he brought Donna Bell to Florida College from east Texas, singing "Kansas City Star, that's what I are, Yodeldeedle ayhee, You oughta see my car." Though united in Christ, none of us had previously known each other, but we soon became fast friends. Donna and I have now been married 49 years. Mike and I have worked closely together as staff writers for Truth Magazine (since Nov. 7, 1974), board members of the Guardian of Truth Foundation (since 1976), and local preachers for the Knollwood church of Christ in Beavercreek, Ohio (1978-82).

Paul wrote in 2 Timothy 2:2-3, "And the things that thou hast heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also. Thou therefore endure hardness, as a good soldier of Jesus Christ." Soldiers form special bonds as they share the experiences of warfare, and Christians and preachers form such bonds as they share in the battle for Christ, for truth. and for souls. "A friend loveth at all times, and a brother is born for adversity." Again, "there is a friend that sticketh closer than a brother" (Prov. 17:17; 18:24). It is a privilege to share the bonds of fellow soldiers and friends with Mike Willis.

Our friendship became deeper and stronger as we shared the preaching duties at the Knollwood church. We were often together with our wives and children in family activities. We engaged in home Bible studies, conducted debates together, and labored on an hour-long call-in radio program every Sunday morning. This program allowed us to interview people in the news. Once we interviewed a Pentecostal preacher in Missouri who had his wife's mother preserved in ice at a funeral home while he attempted to raise her from the dead. During Mike's debate with Primitive Baptist preacher Eddie K. Garrett, they exchanged five questions at the end of each session which were to be answered the following night. Garrett announced that he would be sleeping like a baby while Mike would be sweating over his questions during the night. Larry Hafley instantly learned over and whispered to us. "How does a baby sleep? Sleeps five minutes, wakes up and cries, sleeps five minutes. wakes up and cries." People who heard the radio program over a period of time appeared at the services ready to obey the gospel without further study such as Jeff Conover and his wife, who are still faithful saints.

Mike and I kept trying to impress a new convert from Catholicism named Steve Wallace about the importance of attending all the services. He always thanked us but always showed up only for the Sunday morning service. Finally, after a morning service he excitedly approached us in the vestibule with his eyes open as big as pancakes to announce, "I'm supposed to attend every service! Did you know that? I am really supposed to attend every service." He had just made an astounding discovery! We learned an important lesson about patience in teaching.

Our relationship was not all-workand-no-play. On a Sunday afternoon I covered the chalkboard with my outline including the notation, "Do Not Erase," then we met with the elders about something in a classroom until a few moments before the evening service began. When we walked in, Mike had instigated someone to flip the board over to the blank side so that it appeared the outline was erased – I had a heart attack on the spot. There were also ghosts at work. Dale Rix put a commode out for the garbage truck, but it miraculously showed up on the front porch at my house and then at Mike's house-complete with a dried flower arrangement. When a ghost whose initials are Steve Wallace hung a dead groundhog on my back porch (which I witnessed through a window thanks to the barking of Poochie), it later ended up on Mike's roof, as became apparent when the aroma of well-done carcass was detected on a hot summer day.

I must confess that Mike can be obscure at times. Once he promised that a preacher named Bo Derek would join us for the Florida College Lectures. I asked where brother Derek preaches, but Mike never would tell me and I have not met brother Bo to this day! I should have asked Sandy—what Mike doesn't know, Sandy tells him! "Iron sharpeneth iron; so a man sharpeneth the countenance of his friend" (Prov. 27:17). Mike and I have shared a rich and rewarding relationship as confidants. We have wrestled with difficult points in Scripture, local church problems, brotherhood issues, challenges in the affairs of the *Guardian of Truth Foundation*, and even family and personal matters. Counsel and criticism have been exchanged in brotherly love with never a cross word between us.

When Mike and I began writing for Truth Magazine, we could not have imagined or measured what a blessing it would be for us to stand side-by-side as soldiers of Christ while sharing in the use of this medium for spreading the gospel to saints and sinners through the years. The paper has been an effective tool for proclaiming the gospel of Christ in its original purity and simplicity. It has been an effective medium for exposing error and false doctrine. The Word of God has always been the focus of our faith, not the Foundation or the paper. They will surely pass from the scene someday, but God's Word will stand forever. Still, by God's providence this Foundation and this journal have been useful tools for spreading that Word in our generation. Those who have benefitted from them owe a debt of gratitude to Mike. I have been blessed by Mike's life and work. Generations yet to come will be blessed as well.

The hope of heaven is brighter and stronger for Donna and me because of the life, love, example, and influence of Mike and Sandy Willis. May God bless you both and make you a blessing for many years to come.

I met Mike personally for the first time on July 13, 2004 which was the first full day of the annual Truth Magazine Lectures in Bowling Green, Kentucky. It has always amazed me how much this man can get accomplished and what a great value his accomplishments are. I believe he does this by good old fashioned country-boy hard work ethics coupled

with a love for the Lord and a love for the souls of all people.

Reflections

Mike and I came from a family of seven children (Cecil, Don, Lewis, Ouida, Sue, Mike & Barbara). Sadly, over the years we have lost Cecil, Ouida and Don. We had a wonderful life growing up in Woodlake, Texas. We loved each other and looked out for each other. Mother, Daddy, and our Grandmother taught us the Truth and how to live in the ways of the Lord. What more could you ask for?

Our daddy hauled logs for a living. He left home before daylight and came home after dark. Mother had to deal with all of us kids all day long. We lived on a country dirt road and in the summer we played outside all day. In the evening, we heard Dad's truck as it turned off of the highway onto the dirt road to our home (about two miles). Mike, Barbara, and I would start running to meet him. Whoever got there first got to sit on Daddy's lap and drive the truck the rest of the way home. The other two kids had to stand on the step of the truck and hold on at each window. What fun! Then when we got home, if Daddy had any coffee left in his thermos, he would let us drink it. For the girls, he told us it would make whiskers. I tried it once and have never drunk coffee since. Mike must have liked it a lot because he had lots of whiskers. In fact, he was as hairy as a bear. That is, except on his head. He took after Daddy in that respect because he didn't have hair on top of his head either.

When Mike was about eleven or twelve years old, Mother and Daddy bought the country store in our community. We moved to the house that was connected to the store. Daddy still hauled logs, so we had to help mother run the store. Mother told us that we could only have one ice cream cone a day. So we came up with a plan. We would put as many dips on the "one" cone as we could. Then, throughout the morning we would eat the ice cream off until we got down to the cone. In the afternoon, while mother was taking a short nap, we would put as many dips of ice cream on the cone again! So... we would have ice cream all day long. Genius thinking, wasn't it, Mike?

One summer when Mike was twelve, he was mowing the yard. The mower hit a wire and threw it into Mike's upper arm hitting an artery. He ran inside screaming with blood shooting everywhere. In fact, he nearly died. After that, he was Daddy's "perfect child." You know what that means... Daddy called on him for everything and Mike came running.

When Mike was seventeen years old, on the night he graduated from high school, he left home to drive to *Florida College* to follow in his three brothers' footsteps to preach the gospel. I was married to Forrest by then and we convinced Mother and Daddy to let us follow him to Florida to keep him safe on the trip. Our plan was for Barbara to ride with Mike and help keep him awake. "Do you see a man who excels in his work? He will stand before kings; He will not stand before unknown men" (Prov. 22:29).

As one who has preached the gospel for more than fifty years and who has served as the editor of Truth Magazine for the past forty years, our brother Mike Willis may be fairly characterized as one who excels in his work. Nearly twenty years ago, I was blessed to have the opportunity to work alongside and learn from brother Willis in a preachertraining arrangement. Through this experience I was placed in the unique position of being able to observe his work at close range. During the time that I was working with Mike, I found myself in a private conversation with one older preacher who knew him especially well. "Mike's work ethic puts me to shame," he candidly said. One would not need to observe brother Willis at work for any great length of time in order to understand why such a statement would be expressed by one of his peers.
